uwait is among a handful of countries around the world where the migrant population far outnumber citizens. As such, migration, and migrant problems have been issues of concern to policymakers, parliamentarians and the public in Kuwait, as well as to local, regional and international human rights organizations.

Policymakers tend to slot migrants and their problems into neat cubby holes such



as, labor issues faced by legal migrant workers; abuses and human rights violations against migrant domestic helpers; potential implications of having to harbor asylum seekers, and the ongoing predicament of finding a lasting and widely acceptable solution to the tens of thousands of so-called 'stateless' people in Kuwait. And lastly, the large number of illegal migrants who are considered an economic and security vulnerability to the country.

Spain's relations with Kuwait on an upswing

mbassador of Spain H.E. Miguel Moro Aguilar held an Iftar reception on 17 April at his residence for local media as part of traditional Ramadan celebrations.

He praised the Ramadan traditions in Kuwait that point to the warmth and camaraderie that exists among all communities living in the country, and the wonderful spirit of meeting and greeting people in their diwaniyas and receptions.

Speaking about Spain's bilateral relations with Kuwait, Ambassador Aguilar said fruitful political consultations were held in Madrid last June 2022 at the level of Vice minister of Foreign affairs where many issues were discussed, including ways to increase the volume of their bilateral exchange, cooperation in the realms of defense, culture and in the promotion of the Spanish language, science and sports.

Elaborating on the discussions, the ambassador said many issues of international and regional dimension were also discussed, and pointed out that there was indeed a large space of understanding and for collaboration between both countries. He pointed out that the first bilateral Joint Economic and Trade Committee took place in Madrid on 14 and 15

million euros in 2022). The Spanish imports from Kuwait have also increased 145 percent to €133 million in 2022, mainly oil products.

There is a trade balance in favor of Spain, with a diversity of Spanish exports compared to imports concentrated in oil, plastics and chemical products and the high relative weight of clothing items. The main products exported from Spain were mechanical machinery, non-knitwear (14%), knitwear (9%), fuels (7%) and ceramics (5%).

He also mentioned that the Spanish Business Council was created last year, which he hoped would definitely help to give their economic relations more vitality and visibility.

"We already enjoy a strategic partnership, which is bound to grow exponentially in the next few years, if we all make the right decisions and take the adequate steps," Ambassador Aguilar noted.

Regarding cultural exchanges, the ambassador expressed his sincere hope that these exchanges would improve and enhance the links as Spanish culture was well-known all over the world and Kuwaities, due to their special bond with Spain, really like every aspect of Spanish culture.

He pointed at flamenco being very popular in Kuwait, as well as Spanish cuisine and

Spanish sports like football and tennis. "Both Real Madrid and Barcelona have academies in Kuwait and even Rafa Nadal inaugurated his fabulous academy here," he noted.

"In this spirit, we are working hard to bring Spanish artists to Kuwait. As a result of these endeavors, a Spanish duo playing guitar and violin will perform a concert here in Kuwait on 14 May, with the much appreciated collaboration of the National Council for Culture Arts and Letters."

Expanding on tourism to Spain, he revealed that Kuwait Airways flew officially to Madrid last September the first direct flight between both capitals in almost 40 years, as well as signed an agreement with the Spanish Air Europa for a code sharing agreement, a real hallmark in our relations and a wonderful bridge for both countries to improve our links in all fields.

Ambassador Aguilar concluded by saying that there were around 600 Spaniards living in Kuwait and he was proud to say that they were a well-integrated community present in almost every sector, education, business, sports, engineering. "They are a very valuable part of these people to people relationship between Spain and Kuwait, and I want to thank them for their contributions," he pointed out

She pointed out that bilateral relations with Kuwait are developing significantly at various levels, both in the defense field, especially in terms of training the Kuwaiti forces, the economic and trade levels, investment, health, and cultural and academic cooperation.



Azerbaijan Ambassador hosts Iftar for media

peaking during an iftar reception held last week for media personnel at the embassy, Ambassador of Azerbaijan H.E. Emil Karimov said that more than 22,000 Kuwaiti tourists visited Azerbaijan last year, and the numbers are expected to further increase this year.

Elaborating on the history of Azerbaijani -Kuwaiti relations, the envoy noted that since the establishment of diplomatic relations more than 30 years ago, the two countries had strengthened their relations in all fields, with bilateral ties reaching a peak in 2009 following the visit to Kuwait by the Azerbaijan president lilham Aliyev that year.

He went on to point out that Kuwait provided humanitarian aid to Azerbaijan and supported his country in all international

forums. He also revealed that both Kuwait Airways and Jazeera Airways operate six direct flights per week to Azerbaijan, and Azeri Airlines resumed direct flights from Baku to Kuwait in April 2022.

Ambassador Karimov renewed his country's readiness to cooperate with Kuwait in the field of food security and the provision of meat and agricultural products.

He also invited Kuwaiti investors to invest in his country, not only in the field of real estate, but also in the fields of agriculture, tourism and various other industries.

He pointed out that there were several facilities provided by the state to foreign investors, including exemption from taxes and ensuring the ease of entry and exit of capital.

Kyrgyzstan facilitates visas for several countries

Ambassador of Kyrgyzstan H.E. Azamat Karagulov announced last week that his country recently simplified the granting of visas to citizens of eleven countries — Algeria, Bangladesh, Egypt, India, Jordan, Lebanon, Morocco, Nepal Pakistan, Tunisia, and Sri Lanka.

The government of Kyrgyzstan has decided to extend the simplified system for granting visas to citizens of the above mentioned countries, said the ambassador. He explained that the main condition for granting a visa to citizens of the aforementioned countries is that the person be a legal resident of the following countries — Kuwait, UAE, Saudi Arabia, Qatar, Bahrain, Oman and Brunei.

The ambassador indicated that this decision was taken within the framework of facilitating the visa regime in order to create favorable conditions for residents of these eleven countries in the GCC states, as well as by citizens of Gulf states, for investments and development of the tourism sector in Kyrgyzstan.

Banks to set ceiling on daily, monthly digital transactions

Tentral Bank of Kuwait (CBK) has reportedly asked all local commercial banks to set a ceiling on the value of transactions that individual customers can make on a daily and monthly basis using electronic payment links.

The stipulations are in line with the CBK's keenness to regulate the digital payment ecosystem in the country, given the increasing number of fraudulent transactions that take place through these payment services, and to comply with international anti-money laundering and terrorist financing requirements.

The banking regulator has asked all commercial banks to





He revealed that the political consultations between the two countries is scheduled to




be held in the Indian capital New Delhi next month, which will focus on diversifying the fields of cooperation from the oil and food sectors to other areas as well, including the

hargé d'Affaires of the European Union Delegation in Kuwait, Gediminas Varanavicius, held a Ramadan Ghabga for media representatives on 10 April that was attended by a large gathering of media personnel.

In his address to the gathering, Mr. Varanavicius thanked media members for their support and cooperation with the EU Delegation in Kuwait, and informed them about the Delegation's plans for the coming period, including Europe Day celebrations next month. He pointed out that the High Representative of the EU Foreign Affairs and Security Policy, and Vice President of the European Commission, Josep Borrell, met with the Minister of Foreign Affairs of Kuwait, H.E. Sheikh Salem Al-Sabah, in the margins of the Munich Security Conference on 17 February.

Mr. Varanavicius said: "the EU is eager to continue its political dialogue with Kuwait, to compare notes on global and regional files. He added that the EU has worked constructively with Kuwait on regional issues, such as Syria and the Middle East Peace Process. He stressed that he was confident Kuwait would remain an important humanitarian donor in the Middle East. In this regard, he welcomed Kuwait's participation and generous pledge in the International Donors' Conference for the people of Turkey and Syria affected by the earthquake, which was held in Brussels on 20 March, and said that the EU also counted on Kuwait's participation in the Seventh

Brussels Conference on "Supporting the future of Syria and the region" scheduled for 15 June.


He pointed out that the European Union's new strategy aimed at enhancing its relations with the GCC states, including Kuwait, on a wide range of issues, covering political dialogue, security, counter-terrorism, trade and investment, energy, climate change, education, health, cybersecurity, and strengthening coordination in multilateral fora. The above strategy was translated into joint activities throughout the year between the EU and Kuwait. For instance, on security, the EU organized earlier this year, in cooperation with Kuwait's Ministry of Information, a specialized Strategic Communication Workshop on tactics and strategies to counter radical, extreme, and terrorist narratives. Mr. Varanavicius added that "this Workshop was the first of its kind in the Gulf region and that it has shown that both Kuwait and the EU are facing common global challenges including on security. The enhanced relationship with the Gulf region and Kuwait in particular are important to overcome those challenges together."

Another important area of the EU

Strategy towards the Gulf including Kuwait is to facilitate people-to-people contacts. In this context, the EU Delegation and 16 EU Member States represented in Kuwait will hold a celebration on 9 May to mark Europe Day, highlighting the joint aspirations of EU Member States under the roof of the EU.

Mr. Varanavicius explained that facilitating travel is an important element of enhancing people to people contacts. In this context, the Schengen visa waiver for Kuwaiti nationals is currently in the European Parliament. The draft legislation will have to be endorsed by the European Parliament before the next steps of the EU legislative process can commence.

Mr. Varanavicius concluded by saying that during the visit of Mr. Borrell to Kuwait last year, he stressed during his meeting with His Highness the Crown Prince Sheikh Meshal Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah the strength of the EU-Kuwait partnership. He had also noted that "for the European Union, Kuwait stands as a close and reliable partner". The EU Delegation in Kuwait is determined to translate these words into action by seeking to do more together with Kuwait.


cooperation across various fields, such as politics, trade, education, and culture.








devastating earthquake that claimed thousands of lives, and caused horrendous damage to homes and infrastructure in those two countries.

Kuwait becoming a 'singles' nation

akeshift and ad hoc decisions taken in recent years, usually to placate political exigencies, have led to unforeseen consequences that negatively impact the economic and social spheres in Kuwait.

Latest statistics from the Ministry of Interior and the Public Authority for Civil Information (PACI) reveals that the number of single expatriates in the country have risen sharply over the last couple of years to total over 1.2 million at the end of last year.

This number gains added significance when considering that the country's total population was only around 4.7 million in 2022 constituted over 3.2 million expatriates and 1.5 million citizens. The singles population constituted over a quarter of the total population of Kuwait, and accounted for 38 percent of total expatriates in the country.

The increasing transformation of Kuwait into a 'singles' society has been exacerbated by laws and policies designed to make it difficult for expatriates to apply and receive family visas. Increasing the minimum salary requirements and raising several government service fees for foreigners have led to fewer expats opting or being able to bring their families to Kuwait.

Meanwhile, increases in the cost-of-living from higher rents, food and educational costs, as well as recent hikes in medical services have combined to cause many expatriates to send their families back home, and shifting from family flats to shared accommodation with other singles.

Responsible sources confirmed that some problems, crimes and wrong behaviors are spreading significantly in communities dominated by singles, which not only have negative repercussions on the quality of life of expatriates but also on Kuwaiti society in general

Data available with the Ministry of Interior and the PACI show that the number of families who left Kuwait permanently during the past months has increased, with the total number of cancellations of dependent residencies in the past four years reaching 100,000. The data showed that the annual cancellation of dependent visas ranges between 11,000 to 15,000 yearly. While 64,000 left Kuwait permanently during the Corona crisis.

The figures also reveal that more than one million expatriates, mainly from South Asian countries along with Egyptians and Syrians, live collectively in crowded housing in a number of areas. Records show that 53 percent of the Bangladeshi community lives collectively, followed by Pakistanis and Nepalese at 52 percent, and Egyptians at 50 percent, compared to 33 percent of the Indian community, 17 percent of Filipinos, 10 percent of Sri Lankans, and 7 percent of Syrians.

According to a population breakup report on governorates by PACI, Farwaniya Governorate had the highest number of bachelors, with over 356,000 bachelors residing in this area,

followed by the governorates of Hawally, Ahmadi, Jahra, the capital, and Mubarak Al-Kabeer. Statistics from PACI also disclose that 984,145 singles came from outside Kuwait and are not born of Kuwaiti parents, while non-Kuwaiti singles born in Kuwait numbered up to 145,000 people. Moreover, 32 percent of singles, or around

410,250 individuals were without any educational certificates and were classified under the category of 'basic read and write', followed by 249,000 bachelors who held intermediate certificates.

Segregation of the singles figures by labor sector showed that there were a total of 611,302 singles in the private sector, followed by 302,000 among domestic workers and 22,000 working in the government sector.

Most of the singles, whether male or female, were found to be residing in residences that failed to meet minimum security, safety and



hygiene standards. In some areas there were often more than sic or seven people living together in a room of less than 12 square meters, especially in the areas of Al-Jleeb, Mahboula, Khaitan, and Farwaniya among others.



Korean embassy holds Iftar reception for local media

orean Ambassador H.E. Chung Byungha, held an Iftar reception on 13 April for Lathe local press to mark the holy Month of Ramadan. Ambassador Byung-ha praised the local tradition of Iftar and Ghabga that are being held during the month of Ramadan.

Speaking to the media gathered at the Iftar, the ambassador revealed that an agreement had been signed to establish an institute for teaching the Korean language at Kuwait University. He disclosed that "the Korean language teacher has already been selected and will come anytime soon, perhaps at the end of this month or next month, which means we can actually open the Korean language class in May or June this year."

Ambassador Byung-ha also pointed out that the embassy was planning to hold several cultural events. Elaborating on the planned activities, he said the most important event would be a sporting one, and that the embassy had already invited a well-known taekwondo



team to perform in Kuwait, sometime in May, following which a food festival would also be arranged. Regarding economic relations with Kuwait, Ambassador Byung-ha noted that bilateral trade amounted to US\$13 billion dollars and they have 14 Korean companies operating in Kuwait, who were awaiting the announcement on several large tenders.

Speaking about Korean tourism and the country's attractive touristic venues, the ambassador said: "Kuwaitis do not have to obtain a visa to visit Korea; all they have to do is simply apply for an e-Visa, and they will obtain it within two minutes." However, he pointed out that nationals of other countries would require a visa but it would

take less than a week. He also added that all restrictions imposed during the COVID-19 pandemic had been lifted.

Elaborating on the popularity of Korean products in Kuwait, the ambassador said that "besides exporting cars, mobile phones and many electronic items, nowadays we can see Korean cosmetics being sold everywhere in Kuwait". On medical tourism, the Korean ambassador said: "We have several famous private hospitals that Kuwait usually sends some of its patients who need plastic surgery as a result of fire accidents to receive treatment there."

He concluded by adding that he had a very fruitful discussion with Minister of Public Works Amani Bouqmaz to discuss road repairs pointing out that the minister invited them to listen to her plans to improve road conditions explaining that foreign companies with road maintenance experience would participate in the tenders that would be released by the ministry soon.

Migration, migrants and the marooned

While there are stringent labor laws to tackle labor problems related to legal migrant workers, domestic workers do not come under the purview of these laws. And, despite the access to new domestic worker laws and various plans and policies by the government to provide protection to such workers, abuse of household workers continues unabated. While the government has tended to ignore or pass on the onus of tackling the issue of asylum seekers to others, the issue of stateless bedouns remains a thorn in the sides of authorities that cannot be ignored or forgotten.

Similarly, though the authorities have repeatedly conducted raids, and checkpoints and introduced periods of amnesty for illegal migrants to leave the country without paying any punitive fines, the number of illegal migrants in the country still runs into tens of thousands and continues to increase as years go by. Here we look at each of these migrant related issues in more depth.

Kuwait's uneasy relations with its large expatriate population is nothing new. The country has been a magnet for migrants even before the country's independence, as merchants and entrepreneurs sought Kuwait's strategic location and its bustling port to do business with the Arabian hinterland. However, it was the finding and export of oil beginning in the late 1940s, and the modernization spree that followed the country's independence in 1961 that led to mass immigration of people to Kuwait from the surrounding Arab region and South Asia, as well as from Africa, Europe and further afield.

People seeking work opportunities in mega infrastructure and construction projects taking place around the country, as well as businesses lured by the desire to participate and share in the new-found wealth generated from the flow of oil, flooded to Kuwait. The country's population, which was less than half a million at the time of independence, climbed to nearly a million by the end of the first decade of independence and crossed two million by 1988,

Except for a short sharp drop in the population to 1.6 million in the mid-1990s in the aftermath of the 1990-91 invasion and occupation of the country by Iraqi forces — Kuwait's population has witnessed a steady increase over the years. It crossed the two million mark again at the turn of the century and then went on to add another million by the end of 2010. Another million people were added to the population in the space of a further six years. Much of this population increase was from an increase in the number of migrants arriving each year.

Latest statistics on population and employment published by the Public Authority for Civil Information (PACI) reveals that as of the end of 2022 the total population of Kuwait

grew by 8 percent from a year earlier to reach 4.74 million people. Although the increase of Kuwaiti population by 1.9 percent to reach 1.51 million contributed to the country's population growth, the hike in population witnessed in 2022 came about largely from the 11 percent growth in non-Kuwaiti population, with the total expatriate numbers climbing to 3.22 million.

The demographic disparity arising from two-thirds of the population of Kuwait being foreigners has been blamed for many of the economic setbacks and social ills witnessed in the country. Lawmakers, for their part, have never missed an opportunity to criticize government policies for the population imbalance in the country, and to pressure the authorities to amend the skewed demographics.

Kuwait's legal framework for migration dates back to the 1959 Aliens Residence Law, which continues to govern the residence and employment of migrants. were domestic workers. Around 655,000 expatriates, mainly from South Asia, were employed as domestic workers in Kuwait, of whom 339,000 were women workers and nearly half of them (161,000) were Filipina

Despite the Philippines being one of the main countries that sends domestic workers to Kuwait, and the Gulf nation remaining among the top source for migrant remittances to the Philippines, the working conditions of Filipina household workers, as well as women from other countries, have been an irritant in relations between Kuwait and other laborsource countries, in particular the Philippines.

The latest flare up in diplomatic ties with the Philippines followed the gruesome murder of yet another Filipina domestic worker in Kuwait early this year. In late January, the charred remains of Jullebee Ranara, 35, were discovered out in the desert. Investigations by security personnel led to the arrest of her employer's 17-year-old son who was then charged of murder.

For his part, Kuwait's ambassador in the Philippines Musaed Saleh Al-Thwaikh the 1954 Convention Relating to the Status of Stateless Persons, and the subsequent 1961 Convention on the Reduction of Statelessness, 'stateless' people remains a socially embroiling issue in Kuwait. The country is home to the seventh largest stateless population in the world, but ranks fourth in the world in terms of the proportion of stateless people in the total population.

Except for several thousand bedouns or 'stateless persons' as they are often referred to, who were naturalized over the years, Kuwaiti citizenship is reserved mainly for those born to a Kuwaiti father. Naturalization of 'stateless bedouns' who claim the right to Kuwaiti citizenship is a sensitive social issue and has been a major source of discord in parliament between opposition lawmakers and government's over the years.

Social scientists and population experts point out that irregular migration policies over the years have contributed to the current skewed demographic profile in Kuwait, and the region in general. According to available data from the International Labor Organization (ILO) in 2020, the six Gulf Cooperation Council (GCC) states of Bahrain, Kuwait, Oman, Qatar, Saudi Arabia, and the United Arab Emirates, had a total population of 58 million of whom around 30 million (or 52%) were non-nationals,

Assuming that between 20-40 percent of the migrants residing in the various Gulf states were irregular, this would amount to between 6 to 12 million migrants being illegal residents in the GCC. The true magnitude of this population cohort remains unknown, as available data on their numbers are often at best estimations, since their illegal status means most of them are not recorded on the databases of states in the region.

Studies by the ILO and others have shown that four major social and economic structural features of GCC states lead to generating and sustaining illegal migrants.

These include the need for a sponsor (or kafeel) in order for a migrant to reside and work legally; the sale of visas, or visa trading by citizens and middle-men and their purchase by potential migrants; the difficulty of transferring from one employer to another; and finally, the role that intermediaries play in enabling and sustaining irregular migration.

In mid-February, Kuwait's Permanent Ambassador to the United Nations, Tareq Al-Bannai, told a UN economic and social committee session that the country's social development is based on transparent constitutional rules and guidelines which offer adequate support to its youth, women, the elderly and persons with disabilities. He added that the state provides free social insurance, social welfare and healthcare to its nationals in the event of old age, sickness, or the inability to work. Sadly this caring and benevolence is limited to citizens and does not extend to the majority migrant community in the country.



under the 'kafala' or sponsorship of a citizen. Kuwait's visa regulations are also organized on the TCWs system, with the country issuing eight types of residence permits or visas to TCWs through Residency Articles17 to 24 that clarify the resident status of migrants.


International Organization for Migration (IOM) is the main UN agency helping address migration-related issues in Kuwait. Since its establishment the IOM office in Kuwait has worked in close partnership with Kuwait to strengthen the capacity of relevant ministries and others responsible for protection of victims and the prosecution of human traffickers. The IOM has also organized several awareness raising campaigns on the topic of human trafficking and the rights of domestic workers.

On the issue of domestic workers in Kuwait a report published in the third quarter of 2022 by the Central Statistical Bureau, showed that by the end of the first-half of last year nearly a quarter of the total migrant workers in Kuwait

expressed profound regret and said that the Kuwaiti society was also shocked and saddened by the incident. He assured that justice would be done to Mrs. Ranara, and that such an incident was an isolated case. However, repeated occurrences of such horrendous acts in the past prove that the incident was anything but isolated.

On the asylum seekers front, since Kuwait is not a party to the 1951 UN Refugees Convention, the country does not have an asylum system. With the state lacking the legal frameworks and institutions to deal with asylum seekers, the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR), the UN's refugee agency, is the only institution that deals with asylum-seeking migrants and refugees. According to the UNHCR, in 2019, there were between 692 and 1,700 refugees in Kuwait, and 1,073 asylum seekers, mainly from Iraq, Somalia, and Iran.

Also, as the country has not signed on to

round one in three women have been subjected to physical or sexual violence in their life, according to UN Women data. And this figure does not include sexual harassment. And while at least 158 countries have passed various laws on domestic violence, and 141 have laws on sexual harassment, the best way to prevent violence and crime against women is to empower women with the knowledge and skills to protect themselves.

Founder of US-based company Conflict Defense, John Duza, has helped thousands of people learn life-saving skills to help them stay safe in today's world. "It's becoming essential for everyone to learn how to protect themselves and their loved ones from criminal attacks. Criminals have reshaped our way of life. We must adapt to these dangers to keep our families safe from harm. We worry against home invasions, sexual assaults, car-jackings,

muggings, assaults, and murder instead of living in peace," explains Duza.

A master instructor in mixed martial arts and tactical defense training, Duza teaches life-saving skills to defend against criminal attackers or bullies and to escape without injury. "Learning self-defense skills also



empowers individuals to be good Samaritans to help others in distress. Internally, it builds discipline, ambition, confidence, good morals, and empowerment while harnessing a deeper strength to unleash the warrior within," adds Duza.

The common mistake most people make is that they must be aware of their surroundings, explains Duza. "They are distracted by their phones or on social media, texting, playing phone games, or watching videos in public. They would never react in time to a criminal





attack or any other safety hazards." Another mistake is being too engaged with friends and not being observant of your surroundings and potential threats. "When people are distracted or too engaged with whatever they are doing, they don't see the signs of an attack coming until it's too late, and they become victims. Remember, awareness buys you time, time buys you options, options buy you survivability and escape," says Duza.

Situational awareness is vital for personal safety, and using your eyes and ears to look for potential dangers that may cross your path is one of the first things to do to stay safe. Also, looking down at your phone with headphones on in public is another habit that could leave you open to risk.

'Some tips for situational awareness include constantly looking all around you every few steps to make sure no one is stalking you for an attack, listening for alarming sounds like footsteps running towards you or a car speeding towards you with criminal intent, and being cautious when alone in transitional spaces such as an elevator, stairwell, hallway, street alley, where someone can trap you for an attack, advises Duza.

Other great tips he also recommends are to lock your doors as soon as you're in your car or home, stay in a group when going out to parties or vacationing in foreign countries, avoid flashy

As for children, Duza says that children as young as six can start learning self-defense. "It's important for children to learn self-defense to defend against child predators. It also helps them defend against bullies so they don't go through any torment and abuse. Martial arts also help children develop enhanced cognitive thinking, coordination, balance, agility, strength, mental focus, discipline, confidence, and ambition. It can guide children to stay on the right path for success and keep them from straying to bad behavior and criminal intentions," Says Duza.

The first 30 seconds of an attack determine your odds of being a survivor or a victim. The odds diminish against you the longer you stay engaged, as the attacker may now pull out a weapon, or you may get injured or exhausted in defending, or another attacker may appear and join the attack against you. "The priority is to inflict an initial quick devastating attack to buy enough time to run away and seek help while impeding the attacker's ability to chase you. I recommend jamming the thumb or fingers into the attacker's eyeballs or smashing the kneecaps. The pain is intense and now takes away the ability of the attacker to chase you. The pain affects the physiological and psychological threshold of the attacker, so they are focused on their injuries rather than their ulterior motives against you," concludes Duza.
